RACP rallies medical community on health impacts of climate change

Next Monday, 12 October, Australia's largest medical college, the Royal Australasian College of Physicians (RACP) will lead a day of an international action to raise awareness of the heath impacts of climate change.

With the global support of nearly 50 medical organisations, the RACP's 'Day of Global Action' marks the start of a campaign to commit world leaders to meaningful action ahead of the United Nations Climate Change Conference, COP21, in Paris in December.

Endorsing organisations are signatories to the RACP's <u>Global Consensus Statement</u> which highlights the health impacts of climate change.

At the 'Day of Global Action', topics for discussion will include:

- Significant increases in heat-related illnesses and deaths
- Increases in water-borne and vector-borne diseases
- Increases in cardiovascular and respiratory diseases resulting from deterioration in air quality
- Increased mortality due to extreme weather events
