RACP welcomes National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Implementation Plan

The Royal Australasian College of Physicians (RACP) today welcomed the Australian Government's *Implementation Plan for the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Plan*, to progress the actions needed to make health equality a reality.

RACP President Elect Dr Catherine Yelland congratulated the Government's commitment to improving access to specialist care.

"We are pleased that the Implementation Plan recognises the need for a national framework to drive improvements in access to specialised care for First Australians.

"We know the low-use of specialist services is a contributing factor to the health gap and it is crucial that we address this.

"This Implementation Plan provides a clear roadmap for action going forward. It provides a solid base to act upon and to ensure that the National Health Plan is realised, Dr Yellend said.
