RACP hosts key architect of Obamacare

The Royal Australasian College of Physicians (RACP) last night hosted a Q&A session with one of the world's leading health experts Dr Ezekiel J. Emanuel.

Dr Emanuel is regarded as an "architect" of the United States' Affordable Care Act, or 'Obamacare,' which is transforming health services in the United States.

RACP President, Laureate Professor Nick Talley, said Dr Emanuel has been in Sydney and Newcastle as a guest of the RACP and the University of Newcastle.

"Dr Emanuel is a global health expert and to have him visit and share his thoughts on megatrends in health with College members was a fantastic experience," he said.

"He predicted the expansion of digital medicine, the end of health care inflation and dramatic changes to medical education. It was fascinating to discuss the relevance of these trends to Australia and in particular the work of the College."

Dr Emanuel also discussed his role in the introduction of Obamacare sharing his side of the story, including the highs and lows of the reform.

"I think to the shock of most people it's been more successful than most of us expected," Dr Emanuel said.

"We have seen a big drop in the number of people uninsured in America and the number of readmissions. And it's had no negative impact on the economy.

"Healthcare reform is a continuous process – you have to constantly be adjusting and looking for problems and solving problems. We are not done with healthcare reform we need to now be on healthcare 2.0 in America."

Dr Emanuel also raised the need to transform medical education.
