### **Health groups unite to call on the Government to release children from immigration detention**

18 March 2015

The Royal Australasian College of Physicians (RACP) is one of 15 peak health bodies who have today released a [joint statement](#) calling for all children to be released from immigration detention.

“This is a strong and unified message of opposition to a policy which is inflicting serious and long lasting harm on children”, RACP President, Laureate Professor Nicholas Talley, said.

“The report of the Human Rights Commission’s Inquiry into children in detention was tabled in parliament over a month ago, but we are yet to see the Government acknowledge or act on any of the report’s recommendations.”

“There are still 240 children in detention<sup>1</sup>, and every additional day they spend locked up is further damaging their health.”

Associate Professor Karen Zwi, the RACP’s representative to the Inquiry, saw first-hand the impact of detention on children as she visited detention centres in Australia and Christmas Island.

“The report is evidence of the devastating impact detention has on children.

“The government cannot continue to ignore the situation; it must immediately release all children and their families from detention facilities, both onshore and on Nauru immediately” A/Prof Zwi said.

The RACP is concerned that the Government’s response to the report has focused on attacking the integrity of the Human Rights Commission rather than acknowledging and dealing with the serious impact its policies are having on children.
