	<b>Climate change and health</b> Climate change is already having serious impacts on the Pacific region. This panel session will examine the implications for health, including infectious diseases, food security, infrastructure and migration.	<b>Healthcare issues, policy &amp; advocacy - clinical ethics support</b> Clinical ethics support services are well established in the United States and are increasing in Europe, but are less developed in Australia and New Zealand. In this session, a number of paediatric and adult case studies will be presented to encourage discussion and analysis of the ethical issues that arise in healthcare and promote consideration of whether clinical ethics services might provide a valuable resources for physicians dealing with complex ethical issues in clinical practice.	<b>Over diagnosis and overtreatment</b> This joint AMD and PCHD session will explore how overdiagnosis and the related overuse of medical tests and treatments not only cause harm, but also divert resources from addressing underdiagnosis and undertreatment.	<b>Inequity in child health: addressing the inverse care law – be part of the solution not the problem</b> In Australia and New Zealand, child health inequities mean children have differential health, development and wellbeing outcomes. This disparity is unjust, unnecessary, systematic and, most importantly, preventable. This session will consider opportunities for governments and health services to reduce these disparities, and the powerful role paediatricians can play.	<b>Ramazzini presentations</b> The Ramazzini Prize is awarded annually at Congress to the best AFOEM trainee presentation on an occupational and environmental medicine topic.
