


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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

LOOK for signs of motor development delay and muscle weakness



REGISTRATION

ORATION SPEAKERS



Opening Keynote Oration
Dr David Pencheon – Disruption for sustainable health care
Director of the National Health Service (NHS) Sustainable Development Unit

Dr Pencheon has worked as a clinical doctor in the NHS, a joint Director of Public Health, a Public Health Training Program Director in the East of England, with the NHS Research and Development program, and in China in the early 1990s with Save the Children Fund (UK).



Redfern Oration Professor Alistair Woodward – Climate change – risk and disruption

Head of Epidemiology and Biostatistics, University of Auckland

Professor Woodward was Head of the School of Population Health at the University of Auckland for nine years, and previously led the Department of Public Health at the University of Otago Wellington. He was coordinating lead author for the health chapter of the fifth assessment report of the Intergovernmental Panel on climate change.



AFOEM ASM Opening Keynote Address Professor Toby Walsh – What artificial intellegence can (and can't) do?

World-renowned professor on artificial intelligence at the University of New South Wales and Data61

Professor Walsh was named by the media as a "rock star" of the digital revolution and included on the list of the 100 most important digital innovators in Australia. He is a passionate advocate for limits to AI to ensure AI is used to improve, not hurt, our lives. Toby is also the author of the books 'IT'S ALIVE', 'Android Dreams' and the soon to be published 'Machines That Think'.



Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration

Professor Helena Teede – Women in medicine as a critical component of disruption in relation to the profession, its identity and its interaction with the broader health system Professor Helena Teede, Executive Director, Monash Partners Academic Health Sciences Centre

Professor Teede led the establishment and currently chairs the Australian Health Research Alliance across the Advanced Health Research Translation Centres. She is the Director of the Monash Centre for Health Research and Implementation, School of Public Health, Monash University. She has developed and led Women in Medicine and Women in Leadership programs to engage and support women to advance their careers.

Dr Blánaid Hayes – The health and wellbeing of doctors

Dr Blánaid Hayes, Dean, Faculty of Occupational Medicine Ireland

Dr Hayes has worked as a consultant occupational physician at Beaumont Hospital for over 20 years. She also has experience in providing occupational medical advice to industry, having worked with IBM Ireland over a ten year period. She is a former National Specialty Director in Occupational Medicine and former President of the Irish Society of Occupational Medicine.



Howard-Williams Medal
Professor David Forbes – Advocacy at the interfaces
Medical Advisor, Office of the Chief Medical Officer, Department of Health Western
Australia

Professor Forbes is trained in paediatrics, gastroenterology and nutrition in Perth and Calgary. He has worked in paediatric emergency medicine, general and rural paediatrics, in paediatric gastroenterology and in child mental health. From 1991 he has held an academic appointment at the University of Western Australia.



Cottrell Memorial Lecture Professor Anne Duggan – Clinical variation

Senior Medical Advisor, Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Healthcare
Professor Duggan chaired the Atlas Advisory Group for the first Atlas of
Health Care Variation, released by the Commission in 2015. Professor
Duggan is a Gastroenterologist and Director of Clinical Governance for
Hunter New England Health. She is a Conjoint Professor in the School of
Medicine and Public Health at the University of Newcastle.



George Burniston Oration Associate Professor Michael Pollack – Shifting definitions of health and illness – the role of rehabilitation

Staff Specialist, John Hunter Hospital

Associate Professor Pollack is co-founder of the Australasian Stroke Unit Network. He co-chaired the National Stroke Foundation Working Party to write the first Australian Guidelines in Stroke Rehabilitation, and the National Stroke Rehabilitation Framework.

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

LEVEL TWO FLOOR PLAN






VENUE FLOOR PLAN LEVEL THREE
