RACP demands government transfer pregnant woman on Nauru to Australia

Australasia's largest specialist medical college, The Royal Australasian College of Physicians (RACP) is calling on the Australian Government to listen to paediatricians and immediately transfer a high risk pregnant woman in her fortieth week of a complicated pregnancy from Nauru to Australia.

RACP Paediatrics & Child Health Division President Dr Nicki Murdock said the Federal Government must act quickly and ensure this birth takes place in Australia where appropriate health care can be provided.

"Any mother likely to deliver a baby needing more than the most basic level of care must be transferred to Australia.

"If the services of a neonatologist are needed, it is likely the newborn will be sick and will need ongoing care for at least one week.

"The health needs of babies requiring neonatal intensive care are unpredictable.

"Should the baby need assisted ventilation, it would be necessary to transfer the newborn to Australia for intensive care. Such transports are hazardous and can cause neurological injury or prove fatal.

"Neonatal intensive care requires an established team of staff, with appropriate training who are available 24/7.

"Intensive care also requires equipment, training and safety protocols to allow intravenous nutrition, temperature control and to ensure proper infection control, among many other things.

Dr Nicki Murdock said the Federal Government must immediately transfer the high risk pregnant woman to Australia to ensure the care needed is available.

"A transfer to Australia is the only reasonably available place for such care."
