Occupational Medicine



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"Occupational medicine involves the study and practice of medicine related to the effects of work on health and health on work. It has clinical, preventive and population based aspects.

Occupational physicians practise to ensure:

- effective prevention and appropriate management of people with illness and injury due to work and industry; and
 - the appropriate rehabilitation of people to facilitate their return to work."

Occupational Medicine



- Effects on work of health and effects of health on work
- Holistic expert assessment and management of workers, workplaces, and work to ensure Healthy Work
- Work with allied health, nurses, hygienists, psychologists, treating GPs and specialists, whanau, management, insurers...

Occupational Medicine



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Therefore, Occupational Physicians:

- 1) Look for and manage old and new occupational-related diseases and risks
- 2) Population-based / Workplace initiatives
- 3) Specialist care for individuals
- 4) Negotiation with stakeholders

Health Benefits of Good Work



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 Based on compelling Australasian and international evidence that good work is beneficial to people's health and wellbeing and that long term work absence, work disability and unemployment generally have a negative impact on health and wellbeing

"Good work is engaging, fair, respectful and balances job demands, autonomy and job security. Good work accepts the importance of culture and traditional beliefs. It is characterised by safe and healthy work practices and it strikes a balance between the interests of individuals, employers and society. It requires effective change management, clear and realistic performance indicators, matches the work to the individual and uses transparent productivity metrics"

Occupational Medicine Services



- Preventative initiatives / Upstream services
- Culture, work practices, policy support
- Pre-employment assessment and consideration of effects of work/workplaces on health
- Workplace assessments
- Hazard assessment and risk management
- Environmental monitoring
- Occupational health monitoring and surveillance
- Drug and alcohol programs
- Management of absenteeism and presenteeism
- Investigation and root cause analysis
- Vocational medical services:
 - Individual assessment, management, rehabilitation support
 - Return to work planning, negotiation with stakeholders
- Medicolegal opinions etc...

Considerations



- Privacy: Confidential specialist services, some caveats
- Legislation / regulatory environment: Clear understanding
- Funding:
 - ACC / Workers Compensation
 - Private insurance
 - No free OEM services for non-ACC patients
 - No inpatient or outpatient OEM services for the general public

Support for YOU and your H&W



- Any doctor who is unwell or has poor wellbeing may benefit from the support of an Occupational Physician
 - Reasons to seek expert support include: your health & wellbeing affects your performance, job satisfaction, morbidity/mortality – and patient outcomes
- Support to negotiate the healthcare system
- Occupational Physicians influence work longevity
- If you're not sure if your work or workplace is adversely impacting on your health or wellbeing
 - OEPs have in-depth knowledge of potential workplace exposures and identify, assess, manage and review management of risks
- If you're not sure if an illness, injury, or your current level of stressors will impact on your work or if you have been placed off work
 - OEPs can support you to remain or safely return to work








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An Improved Future State



- Increasing the profile and visibility of the Speciality
 - Sufficient numbers of competent doctors training as FAFOEMs
 - Increased teamwork between OEPs and other clinicians
- Funding changes
 - To create training positions within DHBs and industry
 - To allow referrals of non-ACC-covered public from colleagues e.g. specialist support for inpatients, referral for outpatients
 - Imagine how this would change productivity due to faster return to work alone in NZ & Australia
