Ferguson-Glass Oration

Professor William Ivan Glass



Professor William Ivan Glass graduated from the University of Otago in 1956 and two years later, set sail for London. He arrived with his wife, his bags, no job and nowhere to live. His mentor at the time, Dr Chris Wood, Senior Lecturer in

Occupational Health at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine advised that he enrol there. Bill became a Member of the Faculty of Occupational Medicine in the UK in 1978 and the rest is history.

Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration

Professor John Mills



Professor John Mills is an internationally-respected physician, scientist and businessman. In addition to his Emeritus Professorship at Monash University he holds professorial positions at RMIT and the University of California, San Francisco

(UCSF). He is the Director of Research and Development at TissuPath Specialist Pathology, a Consulting Physician at The Alfred Hospital, Chairman of the Research Program and Research Advisory Committee of the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia (PCFA) and a non-executive director of GBS Venture Partners Pty Ltd.

Cottrell Memorial Lecture

Professor John Chalmers



Professor John Chalmers AC FAA has an outstanding record in hypertension research, both fundamental and clinical. His groundbreaking research on the role of the brain in the development of hypertension led to his election to Fellowship of the Australian Academy of Science and helped establish Flinders University as a leading international centre in hypertension and neuroscience research.

His studies on the treatment of high blood pressure for the prevention of heart attack and stroke has changed the way patients are treated throughout the world. His work has been recognised through many awards including the Wellcome Medal, the RT Hall Prize of the Cardiac Society of Australia and New Zealand, and the Volhard Medal of the International Society of Hypertension.

Professor Chalmers' contribution to medical science has been acknowledged through the award of many Honorary Doctoral degrees and extensive appointments on national and international boards and advisory committees. He was appointed a Companion in the Order of Australia (AC) in 1991 and awarded the Centenary Medal in 2003 in recognition of services to medical science and to Australian society.

Professor Chalmers remains an active researcher at The George Institute Australia, where he holds the title of Senior Director. He is a principal investigator on many research grants and steering committees for major studies, mentors young clinical researchers from around the world, and continues to publish and lecture prolifically.

Howard Williams Oration

Professor Dinah Reddiough



Professor Dinah Reddiough is a paediatrician involved in the clinical care of children with disabilities, in particular cerebral palsy. She is the Group Leader of Developmental Disability and Rehabilitation Research at the Murdoch Childrens Research Institute. Professor Reddiough was the Director of the Royal Children's Hospital's Department of Developmental Medicine between 1986 and 2011 and is an Honorary Professorial Fellow in the University of Melbourne.

Professor Reddiough is actively involved in teaching and supervising undergraduate and postgraduate students, and has contributed to a number of community organisations that assist people with disabilities.

Professor Reddiough was responsible for founding the Australasian Academy of Cerebral Palsy and Developmental Medicine, a multidisciplinary organisation committed to advancing knowledge about physical disability in childhood by conducting scientific meetings and fostering research and evidence based practice. She established the Centre for Developmental Disability Research named 'Solve! At the RCH'. This highly successful group developed a strategic plan and obtained funding which led to the establishment of the Apex Chair in Developmental Medicine in 2011, the first Chair in Developmental Medicine in Australia.

Redfern Oration

Dr Sue Morey



Dr Sue Morey worked as a physician in General and Addiction Medicine at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital while Head of the Division of Community and Allied Services. She gained a Master of Public Health from Harvard University, and was Chief Health Officer of NSW for six years. She was the Foundation President of the Faculty of Public Health Medicine. She was a member of the Doherty Inquiry into Medical Education and the Medical Workforce in 1987 and of the RACP Workforce Committee and the Rural Task Force for many years. Since 1994 she has worked as an independent consultant with an interest in rural medical education and the rural medical workforce. She was made a Member of the Order of Australia in 1999 for service to the development and promotion of improved public health services.

Supporting, Encouraging and Acknowledging Excellence Through the RACP Foundation

The College, through the RACP Foundation, offers awards to cater for physicians at every stage of their research and education careers. Projects supported by these awards are renowned for being innovative and clinically applicable and the results contribute significantly to the medical research field. A number of the awards also represent partnerships undertaken between the RACP Foundation and other leading health organisations, such as the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC), to provide the best funding opportunities for physicians.

The awards currently offered include:

- **Career Development Fellowships**, which support Fellows and trainees at the mid-stage of their research careers
- **Research Establishment Fellowships**, for those wishing to establish a career in research
- **Research Entry Scholarships**, to encourage Fellows and trainees who are commencing careers in medical research and undertaking a research higher degree
- **Research Development Grants**, to provide small amounts of funding to foster and encourage Fellows and trainees
- **Travel and Education Grants**, which cater for those wishing to pursue a postdoctoral fellowship, upskilling or further education overseas
- **RACP Indigenous Health Scholarships**, which provide a funded pathway through physician training for those who identify as being of Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander, Māori or Pacific Islander heritage
- **International Grants**, which are offered to provide funding for international medical graduates or specialists who are intending to further their knowledge in fields of medical education and research.

The College offers and awards a wide range of prizes that recognise Fellows and trainees for outstanding contributions or achievements. These include:

- The John Sands College Medal
- The Eric Susman Prize
- RACP Medal for Clinical Service in Rural and Remote Areas
- RACP International Medal

Many of the awards are presented at the College Convocation ceremony; others are presented at the Congress Gala Dinner, Division or Faculty Dinner or Annual Scientific Meeting.

Overall, the College distributes over AUD\$2 million annually through Fellowships, Scholarships, Grants and Prizes to support, encourage and acknowledge Fellows and trainees.

Venue Floor Plans


