



## Take up the Challenge: Indigenous Health and Chronic Disease

Dear Colleagues

On behalf of the Conference Program and Business Committees, it is my pleasure to welcome you to The Royal Australasian College of Physicians' annual Congress, held for the first time in spectacular Darwin.

The Congress will explore the challenges of Indigenous health and chronic disease from the perspectives of the College Divisional, Faculty and Chapter groups through various keynote and concurrent sessions. Our keynote speakers include medical experts and educators from Australia and overseas, including New Zealand, the United Kingdom, Denmark and Pakistan.

The Congress theme, Take up the Challenge: Indigenous Health and Chronic Disease speaks to the health concerns impacting Indigenous Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Māori communities across Australia and New Zealand.

There is still a shocking disparity between the life expectancy of Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians and New Zealanders. Current figures suggest that Indigenous men and women can expect to live on average 17 years less than other Australians, while in New Zealand, Māori life expectancy is at least eight years less than that for non-Māori.

We are pleased to have the Internal Medicine Society of Australia and New Zealand (IMSANZ) involved again in the Congress and contributing to an exciting Adult Medicine Division (AMD) program. As in previous years, we are also pleased to have some of our other Specialty Society partners hosting sessions at the Congress, with each Society showcasing a range of interesting topics in their specialty area.

Trainees' Day is again a key feature of the Congress program which I encourage all College trainees to attend. Educational workshops, held on Sunday 22 May, have been organised in conjunction with Education Services. I encourage Fellows to attend, particularly as the workshops offer an opportunity to work closely with peers on one of the biggest health issues facing our region. Oral and poster presentations will complete the educational program.

I warmly invite you to take part in the social activities which will be scheduled during the Congress, including the College Ceremony and the Congress Dinner, two of the most important functions in the College calendar year.

Take the opportunity to participate in the important discussions around Indigenous health in what promises to be an exciting Congress.

# Close the Gap

## Take up the Challenge: Indigenous Health and Chronic Disease

Addressing the significant health gap between the Indigenous and non-Indigenous, for Australian Aborigine and Torres Strait Islander and New Zealand Māoris, is a critical priority of The Royal Australasian College of Physicians.

Despite major improvements since the 1970s, disparities in wellbeing between the Indigenous and non-Indigenous, continue to exist. In Australia, current figures suggest that Indigenous children are two to three times more likely to die before their first birthday than other Australian children, and diabetes is around three and a half times more prevalent amongst Indigenous people compared with non-Indigenous Australians.

Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders also experience higher rates of preventable illness such as heart disease, kidney disease and diabetes, while New Zealand Māoris experience higher mortality rates than the non-Māori population in cardiovascular disease, stroke, heart failure and heart disease.

The College has taken a collaborative approach, working with government, industry and the wider community to

achieve better health outcomes and is a signatory to the Close the Gap campaign, initiated in 2006 by Oxfam. The Close the Gap coalition has called on governments to take action to achieve Indigenous health equality within 25 years by:

- Increasing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders' access to health services
- Addressing critical social issues such as poor housing, nutrition, employment and education
- Building Indigenous control and participation in the delivery of health and other services
- Getting governments at state and national level to work in partnership with Indigenous communities and Indigenous health organisations and experts to develop and monitor a plan to tackle the Indigenous health crisis

The College is actively working towards Close the Gap objectives, and has recently received a grant from the Department of Health and Ageing (DoHA) to continue developing its Rural Health Continuing Education program. The 'Australian Aboriginal Child Health Short Course' is an eLearning Modules project that will run over two years. This course has been developed in response to the need for improved cultural awareness in health care delivery and in understanding the

role of cultural and socio economic determinants in health outcomes.

In addition to implementing the eLearning project, the College has awarded a number of scholarships to Indigenous trainees and medical students to attend our 2011 Congress. The College recognises the importance of developing initiatives, working with government and engaging with Indigenous communities to sustain momentum and further the Close the Gap strategy.

Cultural and financial factors and distance have been established as key barriers limiting Indigenous access to mainstream services. Low levels of access by Indigenous people in Australia and New Zealand to primary health care settings and inadequate government funding contribute to their continuing poor health status. Improved primary care access is vital for closing the gap for most health outcomes including chronic disease, cancer mortality, infant mortality, asthma admissions and immunisation coverage. We can all do more to tackle the social determinants of health that contribute so much to these inequities.

The 2011 College Congress is a fitting and valuable opportunity to discuss these and other critical issues concerning Indigenous health with fellow health care professionals.







## Keynote Speakers

### Opening Plenary Professor Sir Mason Durie

Massey University, New Zealand

Sir Mason Durie (Rangitane, Ngati Kauwhata and Ngati Raukawa), is currently Professor of Māori Research and Development and Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Māori & Pasifika) at Massey University and is on the governing body of Te Wananga o Raukawa, a tribal tertiary education institution. He chairs the New Zealand Vice Chancellors' Māori Advisory Standing Committee (Te Kahui Amokura) and is also chair of the Massey University Academy for Māori Research and Scholarship. His research interests include Māori health with a special focus on mental health, Māori development and Māori futures planning. Sir Mason, one of New Zealand's most highly respected academics grew up in Feilding, Manawatu-Wanganui, graduated in Medicine in 1963 from the University of Otago and in 1970 completed specialist training in psychiatry at McGill University, Montreal. The years 1986 to 1988 saw Professor Durie as the Director of Psychiatry at Palmerston North Hospital and then as a member of the Royal Commission on Social Policy. In 1988 he was appointed to the Chair in Māori Studies at Massey University, where he graduated as a Doctor of Literature in 2003. He has been a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand since 1995 and a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit since 2001. In 2009 he was also awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree by Otago University.

### Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration, Professor David Simmons

Cambridge University Hospitals,  
 United Kingdom

David Simmons is the lead diabetes consultant at the Institute of Metabolic Science/Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust in Cambridge, England and a Professorial Fellow at the University of Melbourne. He has previously worked as Professor of Rural Health at the University of Melbourne and Professor of Medicine at the University of Auckland, New Zealand. He has been President of the Australasian Diabetes in Pregnancy Society, Co-chair of the Australian National Diabetes in Pregnancy Advisory Committee, Co-chair of the New Zealand National GDM Working Group and currently co-chairs the Diabetes UK Health Professional Education Working Group. He is the 2009 Joseph Hoet award recipient for his work relating to diabetes in pregnancy. Professor Simmons has established various services including diabetes specialist clinics integrated with primary care in rural and Indigenous communities, multidisciplinary services in diabetes in pregnancy, community based diabetes prevention activities among Māori and Pacific people, and diabetes support groups in the UK and NZ.

### Cottrell Lecture A/Professor Noel Hayman

Inala Indigenous Health Service,  
 Brisbane Australia

Associate Professor Noel Hayman was one of the first two Indigenous medical students to graduate from the University of Queensland in 1990. Associate Professor Hayman is currently Clinical Director of the Inala Indigenous Health Service in Brisbane. His interests include improving Indigenous access to mainstream health services and medical education in the context of Indigenous health. Associate Professor Hayman received the 2003 Centenary Medal for his long service to primary health care in Aboriginal communities and the Inaugural Australians for Native Title and Reconciliation Queensland 'Close the Gap Indigenous Health Award' in 2007. Associate Professor Hayman is on numerous national and state Committees, serving as the current Chair of The Royal Australasian College of Physician's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Expert Advisory Group. He has increased Indigenous access to mainstream general practice at Inala from 12 patients in 1994, to over 4,000 today. Associate Professor Hayman has a Masters in Public Health and has written eighteen publications on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health. He has won nine health awards and is a board member of the Australian Indigenous Doctors Association in Canberra for which he was the foundation secretary. He is a committee member for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, for The Royal Australian College of Physicians and has a ministerial appointment in the Department of Health and Ageing in Canberra. Associate Professor Hayman has improved control of diabetes, improved immunisation rates, is training doctors in Indigenous health and also recruiting Indigenous doctors. He aims for a Centre of Excellence in Indigenous Health Care at Inala, QLD.

## Paediatric Plenary Professor Zulfiqar Bhutta

Aga Khan University, Karachi  
Pakistan

Dr Zulfiqar A. Bhutta is Husein Laljee Dewraj Professor and the Founding Chair of the Division of Women and Child Health, Aga Khan University, Karachi, Pakistan. He was designated a Distinguished National Professor of the Government of Pakistan in 2007. He is also the Dean of the Faculty of Paediatrics of the College of Physicians & Surgeons, Pakistan and the Chairman of the National Research Ethics Committee of the Government of Pakistan. Dr Bhutta is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians (Edinburgh), the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (London) and the American Academy of Pediatrics. He heads a large research team working on issues of maternal, newborn and child survival and nutrition. Dr Bhutta has served as a member of the Global Advisory Committee for Health Research for the World Health Organization, the Board of Child & Health and Nutrition Initiative and the steering committees of the International Zinc and Vitamin A Nutrition Consultative Groups. He is an executive committee member of the International Pediatric Association and on the Board of the Global Partnership for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health. He is the immediate past-President of the Commonwealth Association of Paediatric Gastroenterology and Nutrition and the Federation of Asia-Oceania Perinatal Societies. Dr Bhutta has received a number of national and international awards, including the inaugural award in 2009 by the Program for Global Pediatric Research for outstanding contributions to Global Child Health and Research.

## PRSANZ Plenary Professor Jonathon Carapetis

Menzies School of Health  
Research, Darwin Australia

Professor Carapetis is Director of the Menzies School of Health Research in Darwin, Australia's pre-eminent Indigenous health research institute. He is a paediatrician, infectious diseases and public health physician, with particular interests in rheumatic fever, vaccines and vaccine preventable diseases, and health of children in Indigenous communities and developing countries. Professor Carapetis is also Chairman of the World Heart Federation Scientific Council on Rheumatic Fever and Rheumatic Heart Disease. He was a member of the Territory 2030 Steering Committee where he developed a 20 year strategic plan for the Northern Territory. Since returning to the Northern Territory to lead Menzies in 2006, he has broadened his research interests beyond infectious diseases to focus particularly on education, early childhood and health hardware as some of the critical determinants of Aboriginal health and wellbeing.

## Howard Williams Oration Professor John Boulton

University of Newcastle, New  
South Wales Australia

Professor Boulton gained post-graduate experience in the Children's Hospitals of Perth, Melbourne and Adelaide, and was appointed the Foundation Professor of Paediatrics at the Newcastle Medical School in 1980. His career commitment over four decades in Paediatrics has been on the amelioration of illness in the socially disadvantaged through Community and Aboriginal Child Health; Medical Education; health service development in Newcastle, Western Sydney, and the Kimberley; the clinical science of Endocrinology; and population health research into the childhood antecedents of future disease. In the Kimberley he has developed a sustainable model for remote Indigenous Child Health, formally linked to community health research and capacity-building, and as a vehicle for social justice and reconciliation through partnerships with Indigenous organisations informed by anthropological perspectives and lessons from the history of the region. Professor Boulton holds honorary professorial titles at Newcastle and Sydney Universities.

## Ferguson-Glass Oration Dr Tom Calma (Australia)

Aboriginal elder from the  
Kungarakan tribal group

Dr Calma is an Aboriginal elder from the Kungarakan tribal group and a member of the Iwaidja tribal group whose traditional lands are south west of Darwin and on the Coburg Peninsula in the Northern Territory, respectively. Dr Calma has been appointed as National Coordinator for Tackling Indigenous Smoking to lead the fight against tobacco use in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and is Chair of the Australian Indigenous Leadership Centre. Dr Calma's most recent previous position was that of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner within the Australian Human Rights Commission from 2004 to 2010. He also served as Race Discrimination Commissioner from 2004 until 2009. Through his 2005 Social Justice Report, Dr Calma called for the life expectancy gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people to be closed within a generation and laid the groundwork for the Close the Gap campaign. He chaired the Close the Gap Steering Committee for Indigenous Health Equality since its inception in March 2006, and has effectively brought national attention to achieving health equality for Indigenous people. Dr Calma has served in roles within Australia relating to Aboriginal accommodation, community development and education, and as Senior Adviser to the Minister of Immigration, Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs. Internationally, he worked as a senior Australian diplomat in India and Vietnam representing Australia's interests in education and training. In 2010, Dr Calma was awarded an honorary doctorate from Charles Darwin University in recognition of decades of public service, particularly in relation to his work in education, training and employment in Indigenous communities. Dr Calma was recently named by Australian Doctor magazine as one of the 50 Most Influential People in the country.

## Redfern Oration Dr Kerry Arabena (Australia)

Chief Executive, Lowitja Institute

Dr Kerry Arabena holds a Doctorate in Human Ecology and a Bachelor of Social Work. A mainland Torres Strait Islander currently residing in Melbourne, Dr Arabena is also currently a Director of the National Congress of Australia's First Peoples Ltd. Dr Arabena has a work and academic history including a term as the administrator of one of the most remote Aboriginal Medical Services in Australia and senior appointments in government, non-government and the private sector. She has also worked across Asia and the Pacific in projects that address gender, social justice, human rights, access and equity, service provision, harm minimisation and citizenship, and has represented Australia in international forums on HIV/AIDS and also on climate change.

# History of Named Orations & Lectures

## Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration

The Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration was established in 1993 in recognition of the contribution of Professor Priscilla Kincaid-Smith to medicine in Australia. It has been delivered every year since by an orator of international standing. Professor Kincaid-Smith's many outstanding achievements include her terms as the first woman President of the College (1986-1988) and as the first woman President of the World Medical Association.

## Cottrell Memorial Lecture

The late Dr Jack D Cottrell bequeathed a generous fund to the College to promote the study of epidemiology and the social and community aspects of medicine. The first Cottrell Memorial Lecture was delivered in 1990.

## Howard Williams Oration

An annual award is presented by the Paediatrics & Child Health Division to acknowledge a person who has made an outstanding contribution to paediatrics and child health in Australia or New Zealand. The recipient of the Howard Williams medal is approached to deliver the Howard Williams Oration on a topic related to paediatrics and child health. The Oration acknowledges Dr Howard Williams for his leadership in modern paediatrics.

## Redfern Oration

The Redfern Oration was instituted in 1994 by the Australasian Faculty of Public Health Medicine in acknowledgement of the debt owed to Dr William Redfern for his pioneering work in public health medicine in Australia. He also represented the earliest beginnings of the first medical specialty to develop in Australia, that of preventative medicine.

## Ferguson-Glass Oration

The Ferguson-Glass Oration was established in 1996 to acknowledge two of Australasian Faculty of Occupational & Environmental Medicine most illustrious members: Professors William Glass from New Zealand and David Ferguson from Australia. AFOEM are indebted to both Professors for their contributions to the Faculty's development.


