

# Venue Floor Plans





## Arthur E. Mills Oration

The Arthur E. Mills Oration promotes and encourages medical education and general culture, and the dissemination of knowledge. The Oration acknowledges the late Prof Arthur E. Mills (1865 – 1940) who died less than two years after the inauguration of The Royal Australasian College of Physicians, of which he was a Foundation Fellow. He was an outstanding physician and teacher.



### Prof Sir Peter Gluckman KNZM FRSNZ FMedSci FRS

Prof Sir Peter Gluckman trained in paediatric endocrinology and developmental physiology. He was awarded FRACP in 1978. He was Dean of the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences and then founding Director of the Liggins Institute in Auckland. His research in developmental physiology, epigenetics and evolutionary medicine has won him numerous awards and international recognition including Fellowship of the Commonwealth's most prestigious scientific organisation, The Royal Society (London). He is the only New Zealander elected to the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies of Science (USA) and the Academy of Medical Sciences of Great Britain.

In 2009 he became a Knight of the New Zealand Order of Merit replacing the 2008 Distinguished Companion of the NZ Order of Merit for services to medicine. In 2001 he received New Zealand's top science award, the Rutherford Medal, and in July 2009 was appointed as the first Chief Science Advisor to the Prime Minister of New Zealand.

Sir Peter is the author of over 500 scientific papers and reviews and editor or author of eight books including three influential textbooks in his subject areas.


## Redfern Oration

The William Redfern Oration was instituted by the Australasian Faculty of Public Health Medicine in 1994 in acknowledgment of the debt owed to the late Dr William Redfern (1778–1833) for his pioneering work in public health medicine in Australia. He also represented the earliest beginnings of the first medical specialty to develop in Australia, that of preventative medicine.



### A/Prof Dawn Bessarab

A/Prof Dawn Bessarab is an A/Prof in the Centre for International Health at Curtin University, and is a highly regarded Aboriginal researcher who advocates the importance of having an understanding of the cultural traditions of Aboriginal people. Her own research has enabled her to identify ways in which Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal service providers interact counter-productively because of differing cultural assumptions. She has extensive experience in providing support services for Aboriginal and other Australians across WA. This has led to A/Prof Bessarab recognising the lack of cultural understanding of Aboriginal people and the dynamics of Aboriginal family life in contemporary urban and regional environments that undermines the generally well-meaning efforts of many service providers. The importance of the extended family, maintaining relationship to the land and practising traditional values are often not appreciated by non-Indigenous people. Yet these factors are intrinsic to the mind, body and spirit conception that Aboriginal people have of health. A/Prof Bessarab will contribute to the overall leadership of this research program and her insights into the misunderstandings that can develop between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people will be particularly valuable for this research.

## Ferguson-Glass Oration

The Ferguson-Glass Oration was established in 1996 to acknowledge two of the most illustrious members of the Australasian Faculty of Occupation and Environmental Medicine: Prof William Glass from New Zealand and Prof David Ferguson from Australia. AFOEM is indebted to both Professors for the contributions to the Faculty's development.



### Prof Jos Verbeek MD PhD

Prof Jos Verbeek is an occupational health physician who has conducted research in the area of evidence-based occupational health. He was trained in the Netherlands and moved to Finland in 2003. He is an A/Prof both at the Coronel Institute of Occupational Health in Amsterdam and the University of Kuopio. In Finland, he set up the Occupational Safety and Health Review Group in the Cochrane Collaboration. He is co-author of 18 Systematic Reviews and editor of a guidebook on Evidence-based Occupational Health published by the World Health Organisation.

### Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration

The Priscilla Kincaid-Smith Oration was established in 1993 in recognition of the contribution of the then Prof Priscilla Kincaid-Smith CBE AC FRACP to medicine in Australia. It has been delivered every year since by an orator of international standing. E/Prof Kincaid-Smith's many outstanding achievements include her terms as the first woman President of the College (1986-1988) and as the first woman President of the World Medical Association.



### Dr Mark Graber MD FACP

Dr Mark Graber is a graduate of Yale College and the Stanford University School of Medicine, and received Fellowship Training in Nephrology at Boston University School of Medicine. In 2011 he retired after a 20 year tenure as Chief of Medicine at the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Centre, Northport, NY. Dr Graber has a longstanding interest in patient safety. He founded Patient Safety Awareness Week in the US in 2002, now recognised internationally. His main interests centre on improving the quality, safety, and value of healthcare. Dr Graber is regarded as an international authority on diagnostic error in medicine; in 2011 he founded the Society to Improve Diagnosis in Medicine. He has over 70 peer-reviewed publications on biomedical and health services research topics.



### Cottrell Memorial Lecture

The late Dr Jack D Cottrell bequeathed a generous fund to the College to promote the study of epidemiology and the social and community aspects of medicine. The first Cottrell Memorial Lecture was delivered in 1990.



### Winthrop Prof Fiona Wood AM

Winthrop Prof Fiona Wood is a Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeon specialising in the field of burn care, trauma, and scar reconstruction. Winthrop Prof Wood has been the recipient of the 2003 Australian Medical Association 'Contribution to Medicine' Award and an Order of Australia Medal for work with Bali bombing victims. Winthrop Prof Wood was named West Australian of the Year for 2004, and was nominated as a National Living Treasure and Australian Citizen of the Year in 2004. Winthrop Prof Wood was again named West Australian of the Year for 2005, and received the honour of being named Australian of the Year in 2005.

### Reconciliation in Action





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
